One evening in the spring of 2017, Paul was visited at his home by one of his brothers, requesting that Paul come to the hospital to see their older sister, as she had become ill and was not doing well. Paul got the chance to see her that evening and the next day she unfortunately passed.

Paul's family from Sagkeeng Nation asked that he be there to attend the funeral. Paul's presence lifted everyone's spirits; his brothers and sisters as well as many nieces and nephews all stopped by for hugs and reminiscing.

Plans were made for Paul to come and visit in Sagkeeng and for his siblings to come to Paul and visit him in his home also. In March, he was the guest of honour at a feast put on by his family that was held at an elder sister's home in Sagkeeng.


Paul kept everyone thoroughly entertained with his humour and stories of life in the city. He made everyone laugh when he called his 6 foot 4 nephew "Superman." Being with his family reaffirmed for him that he is greatly loved and appreciated and above all else, respected. He has had several visits since then, and whenever he needs it, his family is there to support him.











STARTING A NEW CHAPTER

In July 2017 a new house was purchased in Garden City. It was selectively chosen with two gentlemen in mind. A plan was in the works. Estimates and quotes were gathered all the while hoping someone would share the same vision as the Director of Services Winnipeg had for the two men that would begin living in the community.

In November 2017, we began the transition planning with a team of fantastic people who couldn't wait for Wayne and Francis to live in their own home. The Facility Manager of another home and I met Wayne as he was eager to find out who we were and wanted to show us all around his home. Wayne was happy to see the new people that were there just for him. When we explained we were from VOI, we were greeted with multiple handshakes, laughter and smiles.

In early December, we met Francis who showed us his great interest in music and where he lived. Francis was quite popular with the people in his life; they went on and on about how wonderful he is and what an amazing person he is to share time with.

In January 2018, the renovations began full force. Walls were being moved to make the home more accessible for everyone and flooring and wall colors were chosen. It was amazing to see it transform from the beautiful home it already was, to something that was perfect for us.

In February 2018, a team of Direct Support Professionals were hired and started training at St. Amant. There, they received the best possible guidance to create excitement and enjoyment for everyone involved.

The team and I began working side by side with both gentlemen and staff from St. Amant. In the beginning we followed routines, watched and learned how they spent time with each of the men. It wasn't long before Wayne and Francis were comfortable enough with each staff that there were no longer set routines, and days weren't planned out with specific time frames. The men were left to explore, learn and grow beyond boundaries and therefore spent their days doing things out of "the norm".


In March 2018, Wayne became used to having one on one time with VOI staff and you could almost hear his smile and sheer excitement when they arrived. He would tour the halls of St. Amant showing off his VOI staff to everyone who worked there.

Francis woke up each morning with a smile on his face and music on his brain. He spent time listening to music in the cafeteria, watching music videos on the computer and teaching the staff all about how he wanted to spend his day.

Both men looked at pictures of the house during the process of the remodel and with each stage the excitement grew. It wouldn't be long before they finally were able to settle into their new home, where they now spend their days in comfort.

IMPROVING INDEPENDENCE





Melanie has used her power wheelchair consistently for over five years. Periodically it would be taken in for repairs but was usually returned to her shortly after. On one occasion the chair's battery and charging port were irreparable. A request was filed to receive a new chair from Reliable Mobility, and over the past year Melanie used her manual chair. This required more assistance from the staff, as she was not as independent. During this time she traveled to and from fitting and equipment appointments. On the brighter side, Melanie really enjoyed testing her new chair and driving around Reliable Mobility and on the final visit to Reliable in December 2017, Melanie received her brand new custom fitted power chair.

She left Reliable feeling relieved and free from barriers, and as she arrived home she couldn't keep the smile from her face. Melanie was again able to communicate to staff where she wanted to be in the house, and what she wanted to do by independently navigating herself from room to room. By the second day Melanie had already learned how to steer herself from the house, onto the ramp and to the sidewalk. For her, the best part of the experience was traveling as fast as she could down her hallway, dodging obstacles with ease.

VALUING OUR INDEPENDENCE

Gerald, Wayne, and Michael moved into their new home in 2015. In the beginning, all three men were assisted in making choices for themselves, including caring for their home. Recently, Gerald, Michael and Wayne have increased their abilities and have discovered their own independence.

Stephen, Key Direct Support Professional, has been supporting the gentlemen since their transition into their new home. "It's amazing to see their strengths grow over the last two years and to see them become more independent."

When it's dinner time, Gerald, Michael and Wayne all assist each other while enjoying a meal together. Gerald will set the table with everyone's plates and after they are finished eating, Wayne brings the dishes to the sink. Gerald will then place the plates in the dishwasher. Michael assists by taking out the garbage.

While Gerald and Wayne are attending day program during the week, Michael explores his different talents and he enjoys assisting his roommates with laundry.



92% of people volunteering chose their volunteer location


OUR DEDICATED STAFF


THRIVE

Much of this year's effort has been put into implementation of our customized database, Thrive. Thrive is such a vital tool for VOI and we are excited to be an industry leader in its implementation. With this technology we are able to track and manage employee files, schedules and shifts, properties, expenses, and programming information.

VOI is proud to be moving forward as a primarily paperless agency. We need information to be accessible from many different locations due to our geographic diverseness and it is completely customizable to our wants, needs and standards.

Although the capabilities and possibilities are endless, this year we focused on two areas; employee files and scheduling. With Thrive, employees are able to track their hours electronically by logging in/out on the Web App.


We are raising the level of IT comfort with employees.



Managers have access to schedule, modify and approve time-sheets for employees, from anywhere, to ensure accurate and smooth payroll processes.



LEADERSHIP MESSAGE

Beyond Boundaries.

Visions of Independence ("VOI") continually pushes boundaries. We have learned this from the people we support. People who push boundaries every day, accomplish things others have said were not possible and achieve milestones that humble us all. We value everyone's individuality, celebrate our different abilities and empower everyone at VOI to amplify their success.

This is a significant time for reflecting on the past several years at VOI. We have reached the end of our five year plan. On reflection, did we accomplish what we intended to? Did we push our boundaries? Resoundingly, the answer is YES.

In the last five years, one of our goals included creating manageable and sustainable growth in order to provide more people with community opportunities. We are happy to say the number of people we support increased by 130% over the five year period! We further committed to providing facilities that meet people's needs and to deliver more individualized supports. To achieve this, we have: added fully accessible homes and fully accessible office and day spaces; increased employment and volunteer opportunities and developed social enterprise models; and supported thirteen people living in institutional settings to transition into a community of their own. Additionally, we've welcomed both the Carman, Quest and St. Claude agencies into our VOI family.

Our strategy to ensure all residential homes are fully accessible has been productive. We've increased the proportion of owned homes by 55% in this five year period. Each new home purchased was accessible or could be made fully accessible with renovations. Our strategy continues, as we work on replacing a handful of un-accessible rentals that still exist, which will take place as our budget allows.

Our objective to increase organisational capacity has certainly met some major milestones, including:

- * Embracing technology agency wide. We are proud to say our board of directors has gone almost paperless!
- * Developing Thrive, a custom database to improve all aspects of data collection and information sharing.
- * Developing a significant social media presence.
- * Developing robust risk management and emergency communications plans.
- * Creating and implementing a vigorous outcome evaluation plan.

Now we look toward the future at VOI. This planning will include all stakeholders -- meaning it will incorporate the ideas of employees, people supported, families, community members and funders! We look forward to working with everyone to affirm our abilities, empower our employees and to go beyond our boundaries.
